### Lakeside's "Kids Zone"

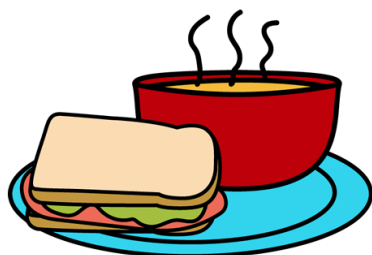

## PONDERINGS WITH PASTOR PETER

*Matthew 14:16-21*

*16 Jesus said to them, "They need not go away; you give them something to eat." 17 They replied, "We have nothing here but five loaves and two fish." 18 And he said, "Bring them here to me." 19 Then he ordered the crowds to sit down on the grass. Taking the five loaves and the two fish, he looked up to heaven and blessed and broke the loaves and gave them to the disciples, and the disciples gave them to the crowds. 20 And all ate and were filled, and they took up what was left over of the broken pieces, twelve baskets full. 21 And those who ate were about five thousand men, besides women and children.*

Dear Lakeside Beloved's,

This past week Thunder needed his semi-annual blood draw to measure the seizure medication levels. This is one way that in partnership with his neurologist, we can proactively attempt to reduce the chances for seizures. Thankfully, having these labs done twice a year as part of his care plan, is helping tremendously. However, Thunder Luke after years of surgeries and pokes, is quite fearful of lab draws and is triggered by different parts that are used. Thus we need a plan.

Working together with doctors, nurses, lab techs, and our care coordinator, we have created and adjusted plans to assure successful lab draws. When we were planning for this last blood draw, we knew that our previous plan needed to be adjusted. Thus through prayer between Heidi and I and several conversations with many on his team, we formulated a new plan. I am pleased to share that this most recent blood draw was successful. It was the most seamless and least traumatic that he's ever experienced. Let's just say that he doesn't remember a thing!

When I called our care coordinator to share the good news, she shared in our joy but couldn't stop chuckling. Finally I asked what part of this she was finding humorous? She began to share that all she could picture was Colonel "Hannibal" Smith from the A-Team leaning against the door frame, smoking a cigar and saying, "I love it when a plan comes together." I burst out laughing and couldn't agree more. I love it when a plan comes together too. Although, Mr. T was

my favorite member of the A-Team. So much so that I was Mr. T one year for Halloween!

You will read Council President Kathy LeMay's article to you on behalf of the council and see that our church is buzzing with excitement in all the ways our church is moving forward and ready to celebrate 40 years of being Lakeside Community Lutheran Church!

The vitality of our church over the last 40 years and the blessing of continuing to love Christ through loving community, has and is being accomplished through mindful planning, faithful discernment, and courageously trusting in God's provision through generosity.

At the culmination of 2026, I'm confident we will see lives that were touched by missions, and children whose faith was deepened through Sunday School, VBS, and our congregation full of loving grandparents. I believe that our congregation will respond with generous hearts, meeting a budget that positions us for sustainability. # Council Corner

## Financial

According to the Lakeside Community Lutheran Church Congregational Constitution:

*“The Congregational Council shall be the board of trustees of this congregation and, as such, shall be responsible for maintaining and protecting its property and managing its business and fiscal affairs”.*

The Council carried out their responsibilities in this area at the January council meeting with the following actions:

- Elected Dave Swan as Treasurer with authority to sign on behalf of the church. (Dave will remain in the position of VP until a successor is appointed or elected by the congregation.)
- Elected Deb Studley to serve as a member of the LCLC Finance Committee.
- Reviewed and accepted the 2025 year-end financial statements recognizing that the annual income from offerings was below budget and actual expenses were below budget yielding a favorable variance.
- Recognized the goal of the Finance Committee, Property Committee, and Council to increase the Building Reserve Fund for 2025 by making a year-end adjustment of \$27,299 to increase the Fund
- Accepted Pastor Peter’s request that 10% of the favorable year-end variance be accrued for benevolence in the form of a tithe to broaden the scope of LCLC mission work.

## Stewardship

We can achieve our approved 2026 budget by increasing our average giving of \$50 per month, per household. It is the hope of the council that our congregation will continue the commitment to be a Spirit-filled church.

## KidsZone

The Council received a written proposal from parents of children enrolled in Sunday School and Anna Treague, Sunday School Liaison, to create a family “Kids Zone” in the front part of the sanctuary. This space will be designed to welcome present and future children worshipping with their families. The proposal was approved and forwarded to the Property Committee for implementation and to the Endowment Fund Committee for funding of items needed for the space.

## Communications

The revision of the LCLC website is nearing completion with the support of an outside consultant and members Cindy Paulson and Julie Swan. The Communications Committee will be meeting to review the work to date and the plan to manage the site going forward. As this project nears the end, the finalizing of the church directory will take place.

## LCLC 40th Anniversary

The first worship service in our church building was held on Christmas Eve 1984. By marking 40 years, this will be an exciting year for our church! The council will be appointing a committee to oversee the planning of events throughout the year in celebration of our history and our future. Please let me know if you would like to be part of the planning – it should be lots of fun!!!

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## PASTORAL RESPONSE TO THE ICY CONFLICT IN MINNEAPOLIS

*Galatians 6:1-2*

*<sup>1</sup> My brothers and sisters, if anyone is detected in a transgression, you who have received the Spirit should restore such a one in a spirit of gentleness. Take care that you yourselves are not tempted. <sup>2</sup> Bear one another's burdens, and in this way you will fulfill the law of Christ.*



Dear Beloved Sisters and Brothers in Christ,

Grace and peace to you from our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ.

I write to you in the midst of families in fear and mourning, a city under siege, and a country grossly divided. I come to you in blissful hope of a love so pure and a gospel so compelling that we can only find one way, and that way is together.

My friends, it is not difficult to detect transgressions amongst each other. Social media makes those visible and clear. Arguments are made, opinions are spewed, and judgments are cast. Right or wrong, valid or invalid, legal or illegal, the verdict is declared. Every transgression to be justified by one side or the other.

The Apostle Paul challenges the one who has received the Spirit to restore the transgressor, most notably, in a spirit of gentleness. In this time of social, civil, and emotional unrest, most assuredly if one was asked who the transgressor is, their finger would point to the other. After all, in this public display of power and resistance, are not both sides victims? If for no other reason than proximity, circumstance, or choice? It's easy to criminalize a victim, justify dominance, or validate disruption of the enforcers for the perceived betterment of the whole. Hence the passionate convictions from both sides.

Unable to identify the transgressor with certainty, at least from the perspective of consensus with the whole of both sides, should we then ask who among us are the ones who have received the Spirit? Would they be the identifying marker of where restoration begins? Which side would the Spirit choose to indwell to stir one of God's beloved into action of gentleness? This is where the gospel gets tricky.

When there are two sides, there is not only one side that God loves and not only one side that the Spirit dwells. The Apostle Paul, when addressing the church in Galatia, was not addressing transgressors as those outside the community and the Spirit filled as the righteous within. Paul was writing to a faith community where the Spirit dwells within the transgressor; the transgressors were the same people the Spirit chose to indwell and thus called to the work of restoration in the spirit of gentleness. Therefore inviting us into the holy work of carrying each other's burdens, even when that looks like firm resistance and mustering compassion for the other side.

Peaceful community does not come with the absence of transgressors, transgressions, opinions, or even sides. It begins with a God that loves "us so much that we also ought to love one another...[for] if we love one another, God abides in us, and his love is perfected in us. By this we know that we abide in him and he in us, because he has given us of his Spirit." (1 John 4:11-13)

Where there is hurt and mourning, how might you carry another's burden to a place of comfort and healing? Where there are timbers of brokenness, how might you shoulder them to the shore of hope and build a bridge to unity? How might our prayers be a call of gentle activism for peace, unity, and love?

Finally, brothers and sisters, bound together by the Cross of Christ and in the spirit of gentleness for the hope of peaceful community, may the grace of our Lord Jesus Christ bless you in the name of the Father, Son, and Holy Spirit.

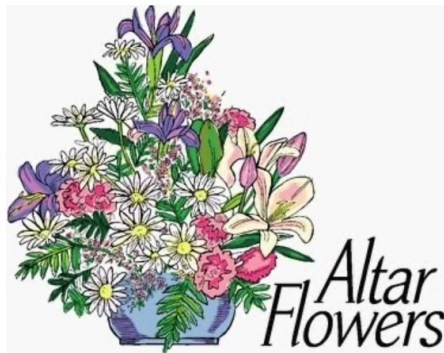
## YELLOW LAKE FOOD DISTRIBUTION
